Each year, Belfast Bay Watershed Coalition's Natural Literacy Educator, Jenni Judkins, introduces students in Waldo County schools to the beauty and wonder of the environment that surrounds them.

This year, she taught more classes than ever before and returned to schools that hadn't been visited in years. In 2022, Jenni taught 397 students from 6 area schools – Ames Elementary, CASS Elementary, Searsport Elementary, Searsport Middle, Nickerson Elementary, Troy Howard Middle and the Ecology Learning Center.

Jenni spent 162 hours wandering with students through forests, wetlands and tidal zones. Using songs, games and role-playing, she brought the life of these important habitats into their young lives.





## BBWC to Assist Local Teachers Teaching Wabanaki History



Jenni Judkins, Belfast Bay Watershed Coalition's (BBWC) Natural Literacy Educator, and BBWC volunteers who extend her teaching, have sometimes been asked for help teaching Wabanaki history. In 2001, the Maine State Legislature passed LD 291 which requires teaching Wabanaki history in all Maine schools, K-12. However, the Legislature did not A fabric map used in the program. With a grant from the New England Grassroots Environmental Fund, the Belfast Bay Watershed Coalition is collaborating with Wabanaki REACH and Waldo County schools to offer a 2-hour virtual presentation of "Interacting with "Wabanaki History" to any teacher who wishes to participate. This virtual presentation gives teachers the opportunity to interact with Wabanaki presenters to gain a better understanding of how to teach Wabanaki history from contact with Europeans to the present.

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#### **BBWC** Trailblazer:

## Jenni Judkins, Award Winning Environmental Educator







Belfast Bay Watershed Coalition's Natural Literacy Educator Jenni Judkins began making friends with nature with her mother, who loved to spend at least one day a week at the beach during the summer. And then she fell in love with New England spaces while visiting her aunt in rural Vermont. "The woods and vistas are beautiful means, always leading to water, where I find myself immersed in my most powerful connection to Nature," says Jenni.

As Belfast Bay Watershed Coalition's Natural Literacy Educator, Jenni has worked with local schools to awaken students to the beauty of the natural world that surrounds them. Her ability to engage students and work cooperatively with teachers resulted in her being honored with the Philip Marcoux Award in 2020. And for the 2022-2023 school year, Jenni has been nominated for Maine Education Association's Eberhard Thiele Environmental Educator of the Year. Glen Widmer, Principal of Ames and Weymouth Schools, describes Jenni's gifts as a educator of young children:

Even though Jenni only works with children in each class once a week, she gets to know each individual child and figures out ways to reach each one. She is both creative and passionate, which helps her reach all students. Not only does Miss Jenni understand students, she understands teachers as well. She is a partner with each teacher to figure out ways to connect to the learning standards for which they are responsible. She is holistic in her approach, finding a theme that excites the students, and which stands as the foundation to support the learning.

Jenni's connection to the outdoors and nature were deepened as she ran cross country in elementary and high school and backpacked in the foothills and mountains of California. Jenni earned a degree in Biology from the University of California, Santa Barbara, and then, in 1998, entered the education world as a teacher's assistant at a residential school on the California coast. In 2002 she moved to New Hampshire and began her career as an Environmental Educator at Stone Environmental School. In 2009, she moved to Midcoast Maine with her husband, Norm, and began leading the afterschool programs at the Nickerson and East Belfast Schools.

Jenni began her work with BBWC in 2018. She says that getting this job was like "finding the Golden Fleece" and that her work nurtures in her a "childlike wonder and joy." The birth of her daughter, Avi, in 2011, profoundly deepened Jenni's commitment and motivation to "honor Nature's space in our development as people." Jenni enjoys "most every part of my classes from greetings to closing circles" and notes that her work is made possible by "teachers who are willing to bring their students 'out of the box' into excitable and informal teachable moments on the trails."

This year, Jenni and her students have been investigating arthropods; they began with insects and are now learning about crustaceans. Jenni's creative approach to teaching children about nature includes making up games and songs, which, she says, are "the biggest tools in my bag next to the species and natural systems who are the foundation and main attraction." 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## Troy Howard Middle Schoolers To Spend A Week on Hurricane Island

Regular readers of our newsletter will likely remember last fall's delightful article by middle school teacher David Wessels, who describes his field trip to Hurricane Island with 14 middle schoolers in June 2022. On that day trip, Hurricane Island staff led students as they explored the coast, observed coastal creatures, and participated in research and aquaculture activities.

Inspired by that day at Hurricane Island, BBWC and Wessels are aiming higher this year. Thanks to First National Bank, BBWC, and a generous donor identified by the Hurricane Island Center, Wessels and fourteen qualifying middle-schoolers from Troy Howard Middle School will spend one week at Hurricane Island this summer, researching the marine environment, participating in leadership training, rowing to nearby islands, rock climbing, and enjoying island life.

A small island two miles southwest of Vinalhaven, Hurricane Island was once a working quarry with a town of quarry workers. In 1964, the island became the first site of Outward Bound. Today, Hurricane Island is a research and environmental leadership training center, and the island's Center for Leadership currently trains and educates environmental leaders from around the world.

## Students Steward Salmon in BBWC's Fish Friends Program

Maine's sea-run Atlantic Salmon population is the last in the United States, so keeping this endangered population alive—and helping it to grow—is important work. And this work is too important not to include kids! Every year, Maine students at ten area schools, guided by Tom King, Vice President of Belfast Bay Watershed Coalition, participate in the Fish Friends program.

Sponsored by the Maine Council of the Atlantic Salmon Federation, the Fish Friends program provides students with hands-on learning about the Atlantic Salmon's biology, life cycle, and habitats. Starting in late February, students incubate Atlantic Salmon eggs in artificial incubators in their classrooms, monitor water quality and temperature, adjust water temperature so that it mimics water temperatures in the wild, observe embryo development, and, in May, release the salmon fry into local streams. Students also learn that "life cycle" means they're not saying goodbye to the salmon they've helped to raise.

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## What We're Reading Now:

## Bamboo Fly Rod Suite by Frank Soos



Frank Soos wanted a bamboo fly rod as he grew up in a poor family in a coal town in Virginia. Those rods were things of beauty, he thought, but he had to content himself with cheap fiberglass rods until years later when a friend stopped by his office with the offer an old bamboo rod. The owner of the fishing shop in his Alaskan town tells Soos that it's a *production* rod. It's *slow*, *worth nothing*, but Soos is a thrifty man, and he believes in the power of a gift, so he decides to refurbish the old rod. In his mending of the rod and his use of it, he sees that that the rod's value differs from what others think of as worth. In a reflection on desire and the false promises of consumerism, Soos realizes that the value of the rod is that it brings him to a place on a river with a fish in his hand, a *miracle of spotted blue* with *rays of turquoise and orange in its fins*.

Soos (1950 - 2021) was a Professor Emeritus of English at the University of Alaska at Fairbanks and a well-known and published author. Before his untimely death, he spent summers in Corea, Maine, with his wife, Margo Klass, a multi-media artist. In this collection of essays, Soos reflects on the ways in which people can make themselves unhappy by wanting too much and going too fast. Soos confesses that he has always been slow, as slow as the old bamboo rod that he adopted. He describes himself as clumsy, too, and he realizes that the imperfection of the old rod is a perfect match for him. He makes mistakes as he restores the rod, and while he is frustrated with those mistakes, what he learns by that process and by fly fishing is a willingness to put up with imperfection, to recognize his limits, and to work with them.

In *Bamboo Fly Rod Suite*, Soos uses stories about family and friends to explore some of what he calls *difficult questions*. But his essays aren't memoirs; instead they are reflections on topics that interest Soos. His prose is down-to-earth, often sounding like a conversation he might have with a friend, riding home from the river in the front seat of his old truck. Soos reflects on the difference between worth and value, on being slow, clumsy, and imperfect, and on the frustration of loss. Yet despite the seriousness of these questions, the merit of these essays is that in them, we hear the voice of a man who is puzzling out the complications of human life but at the same time, awake to the beauty of the natural world and content to be standing in a wild river with a fly rod in his hand.

## BBWC Reads Through a Maine Winter



In addition to cross country skiing and birding on the bridge, this year the Belfast Bay Watershed Coalition offered a series of book discussion groups to keep its members active during Maine's long, dark winter. The book group was developed and led by 2022 Penobscot Bay Stewards. In January, Jennifer Craig led a discussion of *The Weir*, a classic novel by Maine's own Ruth Moore. In February, Kathleen Reilly facilitated a lively exchange about Colin Woodard's history of Maine, *The Lobster Coast: Rebels, Rusticators, and the Struggle for a Forgotten Frontier* and how the coastal communities of Maine have developed over the centuries. Kate Hanson concluded the discussion series in March with *Mill Town: Reckoning with What Remains*, a close look Mexico Maine and the realities of living in a community that was economically dependent on the paper mill and also sickened by the toxic fumes of that industry. Each book gave the discussion group a chance to reflect on the history, economics, and culture and the impact of human choices in Maine and on the natural world. The series was supported by the Belfast Free Library and Left Bank Books offered a generous discount to readers.
