Bird Day at Searsport Elementary School



On February 12, four BBWC volunteer educators affiliated with the Maine Master Naturalist Program offered Bird Day at Searsport Elementary School to 45 kindergarteners and their teachers. Children rotated through four stations. Deb Smith taught about owls, showing real stuffed owls, owl pellets, and reconstructed skeletons of rodents found in the pellets. Pictured above are owl masks she helped the children make. Beth Henderson, a sculptor, taught about the many properties of feathers, followed by a cardinal feather making activity. Beth will assemble a large cardinal sculpture of all the feathers for the school. Mike Shannon demonstrated the diversity and specialization of eyes, ears, wings, feet, and beaks with his stuffed bird collection. Cloe Chunn invited each child to "be" a bird, learn its song, and identify each other by songs. This was the kick-off for a week of bird study for the youngsters.

Hills to Sea Trail is Finding its Path

On February 13, ten of the Hills to Sea Trail Blazers snowshoed from Frye Mountain Road through the Game Preserve to Rt. 137. Pictured below is an enjoyable side trip to Mixer Pond to admire two long established beaver lodges. 

March 15, Saturday. 10:00-1:00. Join Skip Pendleton for a tour of the various skiing and walking trails he has added as offshoots of the Little River Community Trail. Meet at the kiosk at Walsh Ball Field on Rt. 52. Bring water, lunch, warm layers, and footwear for skiing or snowshoeing. Easy to moderate.
